SUBJECT FY24 – FY27 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) –

GRTC Existing Project Amendments

BRIEF:

GRTC submitted a request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to provide funding updates. Staff has reviewed the requested changes to update the estimates and planned obligations for multiple projects in the FY24 – FY27 TIP (UPC GRTC004, UPC GRTC005, UPC GRTC008, UPC GRTC031, UPC GRTC056, UPC GRTC059, UPC GRTC065, UPC GRTC067). Staff has reviewed the changes and eight (8) of the requested changes require TIP Amendments.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends approval of the proposed TIP amendments as requested by GRTC. A draft resolution of approval is included in Attachment B for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

Under Federal law and agreements with state agencies, the Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) has authority to select projects and program regional Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds, including the Transportation Alternatives (TA) set-aside.

For other funding programs, the RRTPO does not have authority to select projects but is responsible for adding projects to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Based on federal regulations and RRTPO policy, all projects proposed to be added to the TIP are screened for consistency with the regional long-range transportation plan, ConnectRVA 2045, and the regional conformity assessment. All proposed revisions are also evaluated for fiscal constraint, or the ability to fund the project with projected revenues.

The proposed amendment requested by GRTC has been reviewed by staff and found consistent with the requirements for RRTPO approval. The draft TIP block can be found in Attachment A. A summary of the findings for each requirement is included below.

<u>Project Overview</u>: GRTC is requesting the following nine amendments to the TIP to perform various functions that will assist the agency in providing safe, effective, and comfortable





transit to the Richmond region.

- **UPC GRTC004** Seeks to use 5307 funding to replace GRTCs rolling vehicle stock. The project totals \$47,904,000 with approximately 28% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- UPC GRTC005 Seeks to use 5307 funding to provide transit amenities for passengers. The project totals \$18,212,000 with approximately 30% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- **UPC GRTC008** Seeks to use a combination of 5339 and 5307 funding to acquire paratransit vehicles to provide paratransit services for GRTC ridership. The project totals \$19,470,000 with approximately 30% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- **UPC GRTC031** Seeks to use 5307 funding provided to enhance surveillance and security equipment for GRTC property. The project totals \$2,106,000 with approximately 41% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- **UPC GRTC056** Seeks to use 5307 funding to facilitate the renovation of administrative and maintenance facilities. The project totals \$4,125,000 with approximately 35% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- **UPC GRTC059** Seeks to use 5307 funding to facilitate non-fixed route ADA paratransit services. The project totals \$6,500,000 with approximately 80% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from local funding.
- **UPC GRTC065** Seeks to use 5307 funding to obtain articulated vehicles. The project totals \$19,250,000 with approximately 28% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.
- **UPC GRTC067** Seeks to use 5307 funding for planning consultant services. The project totals \$8,964,000 with approximately 36% coming from FTA funding, and the remaining funds coming from a combination of State and local funding.

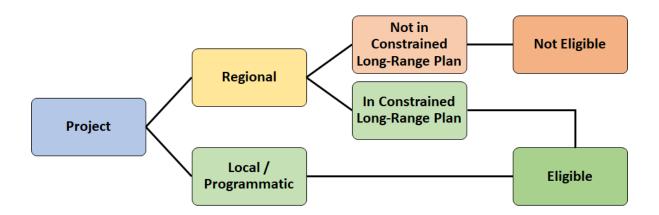


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency: ConnectRVA 2045 establishes categories of projects which are regional in nature and must be included in the constrained long-range plan (CLRP) prior to inclusion in the TIP. Conversely, other project types are considered either local or programmatic in nature and can advance without being specifically listed. The project types under each category can be reviewed in Chapter 5 of ConnectRVA 2045. These projects are considered local/pragmatic in nature due to their scale and project type. Figure 1 graphically shows the consistency review process.

<u>Air Quality Conformity</u>: Portions of the RRTPO were formerly part of the 1997 8-hour Ozone Maintenance Area and projects in these areas must either be part of the Regional Conformity Assessment or must be exempt from air quality conformity analysis under federal regulations prior to being added to the TIP. These projects are already included in the regional air quality conformity report and have previously been determined to be exempt from Air Quality Conformity under 40 CFR § 93.126.

<u>Fiscal Constraint</u>: The proposed changes to the TIP are reflective of the approved FY24 Six-Year Improvement Program (SYIP) adopted by the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB). The requested revisions reflect funds that have been allocated to the project.

- **UPC GRTC004** The changes in FY25 are as follows; 5307 funding increased from 3,024,000 to 3,136,000, State funding increased from 7,344,000 to 7,616,000, local funding increased 432,000 to 448,000. The changes in FY26 are as follows; 5307 increased from 4,032,000 to 6,161,000, state increased from 9,792,000 to 14,963, local increased from 576,000 to 880,000. The changes in FY27 are as follows; 5307 672,000 to 2,772,000, state increased from 1,632,000 to 2,772,000, state increased to 1,632,000 to 6,732,000, and local increased 96,000 to 396,000. The total increased from 32,400,000 to 47,905,000.
- **UPC GRTC005** The changes in FY25 are as follows; the 5307 funding has increased from \$28,000 to \$1,329,000, State funding increased from \$68,000 to \$3,229,000, local increased from \$4,000 to \$200,000. The changes in FY26 are as follows; the funding from 5307 is increased from \$28,000 to \$1,140,000, the state funding increased from \$68,000 to \$2,770,000, to local \$4,000 to \$162,000. The changes in FY27 are from \$28,000 to \$1,442,000, the state funding increased from \$68,000 to





- \$3,502,000, the local funding increased from \$4,000 to \$206,000. The total increased from \$4,532,000 to \$18,212,000.
- **UPC GRTC008** In FY25 the changes are as follows; in 5307 the funding increases from 998,200 to 2,128,000, the funding increases from \$2,42,200 to \$5,168,000, to Local \$142,600 to \$304,000. In FY26 the changes are as follows; 5307 increased from \$483,200 to \$840,000, State increased from \$1,173,200 to \$2,040,000 and local increased from \$69,000 to \$120,000. In FY27 the changes are as follows; 5307 increased \$998,200 to \$717,000, State decreased \$2,424,200 to \$1,741,000 and local decreased to \$142,600 to \$102,000. The total increased from \$15,165,654 to \$19,470,000.
- **UPC GRTC031** In FY25 there has been an increase in 5307 funding from \$0 to \$751,000 in State funding there has been an increase from \$0 to \$1,065,000, and local funding went from \$0 to \$140,000. These changes increased the total from \$150,000 to \$2,106,000.
- **UPC GRTC056** FY25 changes are as follows; 5307 funds increased from \$28,000, to \$428,000 and State increased from \$680,000 to \$748,000. FY26 changes are as follows; 5307 increased from \$28,000 to \$555,000, state increased from 68,000 to 500,000, and local increased from \$4,000 to \$120,000. FY27 changes are as follows; 5307 increased from \$28,000 to 406,000, State increased from \$68,000 to \$986,000, and Local from \$4,000 to \$58,000. These changes increased the total from \$1,550,000 to \$4,125,000.
- **UPC GRTC059** Additional funding of FTA 5307 funding of \$1,300,000 in FY25-FY27 and \$325,000 in local funding for the same years increasing the total from \$1,625,000 to \$6,500,000.
- **UPC GRTC065** Addition of \$1,960,000 in 5307 funding, \$4,760,000 in state, and 280,000 in local funds all in FY25 the same funding changes also happened in FY27, and in FY26 there was an increase of \$798,000 of 5307 funds, \$1,938,000 in state, and \$114,000 in local funding this brings the total from \$2,400,000 to \$19,250,000.
- UPC GRTC067 Additional Funding of \$1,598,000 of 5307, \$3,502,000 in State funding, and \$206,000 in Local funding in FY25. Additional funding in \$140,000 in 5307, \$340,000 in State funding, and 20,000 in Local funding in FY27. Bringing the total from \$3,158,000 to \$8,964,000.

Federal Fund Source Descriptions:

FTA 5307 – Provides funding to public transit systems in large urban areas for capital, planning, job access projects, and some operating expenses such as ADA Paratransit & Preventative maintenance.

FTA 5339 – Provides funding to transit agencies and states to replace, rehabilitate and purchase buses and related equipment and to construct bus related facilities.





FTA 5310- Provides funding to assist local transit agencies, governments, and nonprofit groups in meeting the needs of seniors and people with disabilities.

BRIEF:

The Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) has submitted a request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to provide funding updates. Staff has reviewed the requested changes to update the planned obligations for multiple projects in the FY24 – FY27 TIP (UPC CCH001, UPC CCH002, UPC CAA0001, UPCC CAA0002). Staff has reviewed the changes and four (4) of the requested changes require TIP Amendments.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends approval of the proposed TIP amendment as requested by DRPT. A draft resolution of approval is included in Attachment B for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

Under Federal law and agreements with state agencies, the Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) has authority to select projects and program regional Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds, including the Transportation Alternatives (TA) set-aside.

For other funding programs, the RRTPO does not have authority to select projects but is responsible for adding projects to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Based on federal regulations and RRTPO policy, all projects proposed to be added to the TIP are screened for consistency with the regional long-range transportation plan, ConnectRVA 2045, and the regional conformity assessment. All proposed revisions are also evaluated for fiscal constraint, or the ability to fund the project with projected revenues.

The proposed amendment requested by DRPT has been reviewed by staff and found consistent with the requirements for RRTPO approval. The draft TIP block can be found in Attachment A. A summary of the findings for each requirement is included below.

Project Overview:

DRPT is requesting the following four amendments to the TIP for the following projects:

• **UPC CCH001** – Seeks to use 5310 funding to provide mobility management services in Chesterfield County. The project totals \$675,000 with 80% coming from FTA funding, and remaining funds coming from a combination of state



and local funding.

- **UPC CCH002** Seeks to use 5310 funding to provide operating assistance in Chesterfield County. The project totals \$152,000 with 50% coming from FTA funding, and remaining funds coming from a combination of state and local funding.
- **UPC CAA0001** Seeks to use 5310 funding to provide operating assistance to the Capital Area Agency on Aging Senior Connections. The project totals \$273,000 with 50% coming from FTA funding, and remaining funds coming from a combination of state and local funding.
- **UPC CAA0002** Seeks to use 5310 funding to provide mobility management services to the Capital Area Agency on Aging Senior Connections. The project totals \$499,000 with 80% coming from FTA funding, and remaining funds coming from a combination of state and local funding.

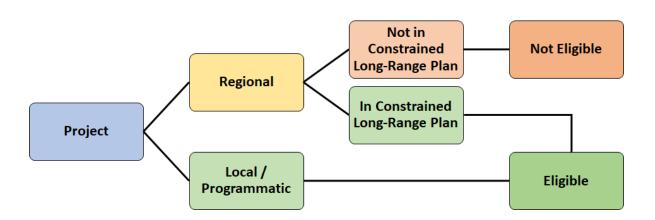


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

- **CAA0001** The changes in FY24 are as follows; Increase FTA 5310 from \$62,000 to \$137,000, increase state from \$48,000 to \$109,000 and increase local from \$13,000 to \$27,000.
- **CAA0002** The changes in FY24 are as follows; Increase FTA 5310 from \$172,000 to \$399,000, increase state from \$34,000 to \$80,000, and increase local from \$9,000 to \$20,000.

19035 Janke Road - 2 Lane Roads

BRIEF:

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has submitted a request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to update the Jahnke Road Improvements project, UPC 19035. The project enhances safety and accessibility along the corridor with improved entrances, upgraded traffic signals, a raised median, new sidewalks, a shared-use path, a cycle track, and speed tables.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends approval of the proposed TIP amendments as requested by VDOT. A draft resolution of approval is included in Attachment B for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

Under Federal law and agreements with state agencies, the Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) has authority to select projects and program regional Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds, including the Transportation Alternatives (TA) set-aside.

For other funding programs, the RRTPO does not have authority to select projects but is responsible for adding projects to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Based on federal regulations and RRTPO policy, all projects proposed to be added to the TIP are screened for consistency with the regional long-range transportation plan, ConnectRVA 2045, and the regional conformity assessment. All proposed revisions are also evaluated for fiscal constraint, or the ability to fund the project with projected revenues.

The proposed amendment requested by VDOT has been reviewed by staff and found consistent with the requirements for RRTPO approval. Draft TIP blocks can be found in Attachment A. A summary of the findings for each requirement is included below.

<u>Project Overview</u>: The project focuses on enhancing safety, accessibility, drainage, multi-modal transportation, and aesthetics along the corridor. Key improvements include better access to private entrances, an upgraded traffic





signal at Forestview School Drive, and installation of a center raised median with landscaping and turn lanes at high-traffic intersections. Additionally, curb and gutter will be installed on both sides of Jahnke Road west of the CSX railroad, along with an 8-foot shared-use path on the north side and a 5-foot sidewalk on the south side. Sidewalk improvements will occur between Forest Hill Ave and Clarence Street, with new construction from Clarence Street to Blackmore Road. A two-way cycle track will also be added along westbound Jahnke Road, and speed tables will be placed at Westover Hills Elementary School.

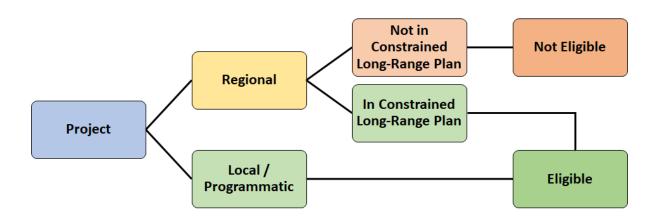


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency: ConnectRVA 2045 establishes categories of projects which are regional in nature and must be included in the constrained long-range plan (CLRP) prior to inclusion in the TIP. Conversely, other project types are considered either local or programmatic in nature and can advance without being specifically listed. The project types under each category can be reviewed in Chapter 5 of ConnectRVA 2045. This project is considered local/programmatic in nature due to the size and the character of the safety improvements. Figure 1 graphically shows the consistency review process.

<u>Air Quality Conformity</u>: Portions of the RRTPO were formerly part of the 1997 8-hour Ozone Maintenance Area and projects in these areas must either be part of the Regional Conformity Assessment or must be exempt from air quality conformity analysis under federal regulations prior to being added to the TIP. These projects are already included in the regional air quality conformity report and have previously been determined to be exempt from Air Quality Conformity under 40 CFR § 93.126.

<u>Fiscal Constraint</u>: The funding changes are as follows: transfer \$328,000 (RSTP) from FFY24 to FFY25 and add \$389,840 for the PE phase. Transfer \$120,000 (RSTP) from FFY24 to FFY25 and add \$832,918 for the RW phase. Move \$865,522





(CM) from FFY24 to FFY25 and transfer \$5,117,417 (RSTP) from FFY24 to FFY25 while adding \$2,516,076. Release \$680,000 (STP/STBG) for FFY24. Transfer \$9,126,994 (AC-Other) from FFY24 to FFY25 and add \$1,861,223 for the CN phase.

Federal Fund Source Descriptions:

RSTP - The Regional Surface Transportation Program, provides flexible federal funding for a variety of transportation projects, including highways, transit, and pedestrian facilities. Administered through metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs), it allows local jurisdictions to prioritize projects that meet regional needs.

CMAQ - The Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement program, provides federal funding to enhance air quality and reduce congestion in urban areas. It supports projects like transit improvements, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, and alternative fuel initiatives. Administered through metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs), CMAQ allows localities to prioritize projects that align with their air quality goals, promoting sustainable transportation.

BRIEF:

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) submitted a request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to update funding for the first phase of the Bailey Bridge Connector/Brad McNeer Connector project, UPC 111713. The project will use federal funds to build a two-lane road with a bridge and roundabouts, as well as a shared-use path. This project has a total estimate of \$36,464,535 and was awarded \$34,812,505 in funding through the Surface Transportation Block Grant program. The remaining balance will be paid for with local funding.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends approval of the proposed TIP amendment as requested by VDOT. A draft resolution of approval is included in Attachment B for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

Project Overview:





Federal funding will be used to construct a two-lane road from Brad McNeer Parkway to Bailey Bridge Road, including roundabouts at both ends, a bridge over Swift Creek, and a shared-use path. This project aims to alleviate congestion on Route 360, which currently carries over 78,000 vehicles daily and is projected to exceed 120,000 by 2040. The improvements will provide direct access to businesses along Route 360, reduce traffic volumes, and offer safer travel options for pedestrians and cyclists.

ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency:

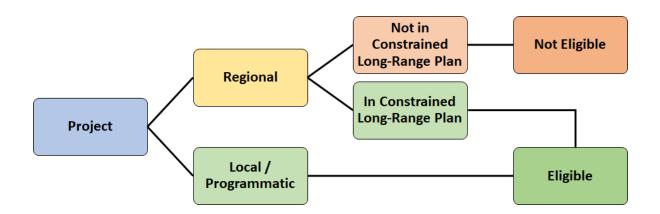


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

ConnectRVA 2045 establishes categories of projects which are regional in nature and must be included in the constrained long-range plan (CLRP) prior to inclusion in the TIP. Conversely, other project types are considered either local or programmatic in nature and can advance without being specifically listed. The project types under each category can be reviewed in Chapter 5 of ConnectRVA 2045. Figure 1 graphically shows the consistency review process.

This project is considered regional in nature due to its scope including the addition of new lanes, and intersection improvements. This project is already included in the LRTP as a committed project.

<u>Air Quality Conformity</u>: Portions of the RRTPO were formerly part of the 1997 8-hour Ozone Maintenance Area and projects in these areas must either be part of the Regional Conformity Assessment or must be exempt from air quality conformity analysis under federal regulations prior to being added to the TIP. This project is regionally significant as it includes a new roadway and is part of a broader plan for interchange and arterial improvements along 288 and 360. The project is already included in the TIP and the regional conformity assessment report.

<u>Fiscal Constraint</u>: The funding changes are as follows: The TIP amendment





involves releasing and adding funds across various phases. Release \$2,000,000 for PE in FFY26, release \$2,000,000 for AC-Other in FFY24 and add \$248,000 for RW in FFY25 and in FFY26. Add an additional \$9,237,765 and an additional \$1,351,970 in FFY25 and add \$1,351,970 in FFY26 for the CN Phase.

- New diverging diamond interchange at N. Gayton Rd.
- Mainline improvements along I-64 and N. Gayton Rd.
- Restriping the east bound I-64 ramp diverge at I-295 to create one exit-only lane and one choice lane
- New auxiliary lane on north bound I-295 between I-64 and Nuckols Rd interchange
- Converting the existing I-64 and US-250 interchange to a partial cloverleaf interchange with improvements along US-250
- New auxiliary lane on west bound I-64 between the US-250 and I-295 interchanges

This is a part of a larger project which aims to address safety and operational issues along the I-64 corridor from the Gaskins Rd. interchange to the Rt. 288 interchange.

ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency:

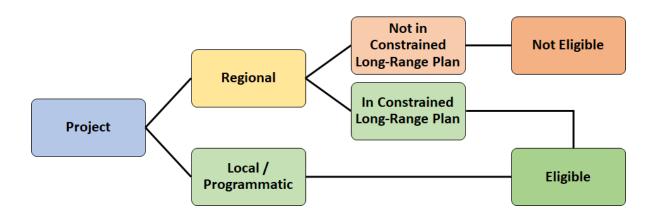


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

ConnectRVA 2045 establishes categories of projects which are regional in nature and must be included in the constrained long-range plan (CLRP) prior to inclusion in the TIP. Conversely, other project types are considered either local or programmatic in nature and can advance without being specifically listed. The project types under each category can be reviewed in Chapter 5 of ConnectRVA 2045. Figure 1 graphically shows the consistency review process.

This project is considered regional in nature due to its scope including modifications





to existing interchanges, and the addition of new lanes. This project combines multiple regional projects from the constrained long-range plan.

Air Quality Conformity: Portions of the RRTPO were formerly part of the 1997 8-hour Ozone Maintenance Area and projects in these areas must either be part of the Regional Conformity Assessment or must be exempt from air quality conformity analysis under federal regulations prior to being added to the TIP. This project is regionally significant as it includes the building of additional lanes and interchange improvements and it is part of a broader plan for interchange and arterial improvements along I-64. As a planned project in the CLRP, the improvements in this project are already included in the regional conformity assessment report.

<u>Fiscal Constraint</u>: The funding changes are as follows: The TIP amendment involves adding funds across various phases. Add \$16,964,000 for PE in FFY25 and add \$15,039,412 for RW in FFY27.

SUBJECT FY24 - FY27 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) - UPC

125979 I-64 Exit 211 Interchange Improvements

BRIEF:

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has submitted a request to amend the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to add the I-64 Exit 211 Interchange Improvements, UPC 125979. Buc-ee's Travel Center is expanding to New Kent County, Virginia, and is collaborating with VDOT and County planners to implement essential transportation improvements, including coordination with the I-64 widening project and overpass revisions. These enhancements are part of the Route 106 Arterial Management Plan to support regional growth.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends approval of the proposed TIP amendments as requested by VDOT. A draft resolution of approval is included in Attachment B for consideration.

DISCUSSION:

Under Federal law and agreements with state agencies, the Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) has authority to select projects and program regional Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds, including the Transportation Alternatives (TA) set-aside.

For other funding programs, the RRTPO does not have authority to select projects but is responsible for adding projects to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Based on federal regulations and RRTPO policy, all projects proposed to be added to the TIP are screened for consistency with the regional long-range transportation plan, ConnectRVA 2045, and the regional conformity assessment. All proposed revisions are also evaluated for fiscal constraint, or the ability to fund the project with projected revenues.

The proposed amendment requested by VDOT has been reviewed by staff and found consistent with the requirements for RRTPO approval. Draft TIP blocks can be found in Attachment A. A summary of the findings for each requirement is included below.

<u>Project Overview</u>: Buc-ee's Travel Center is expanding to New Kent County, Virginia, at the Exit 211 interchange along Interstate 64, with plans for a 74,000





square-foot store and extensive fueling and parking facilities. To support this development, the Buc-ee's team is working closely with the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and County planners to implement necessary transportation improvements. Key efforts include coordinating design and construction with the ongoing I-64 widening project, addressing required overpass revisions, and ensuring that traffic improvements align with the project timeline. These enhancements are part of the Route 106 Arterial Management Plan, which outlines strategic improvements to accommodate growth in the area.

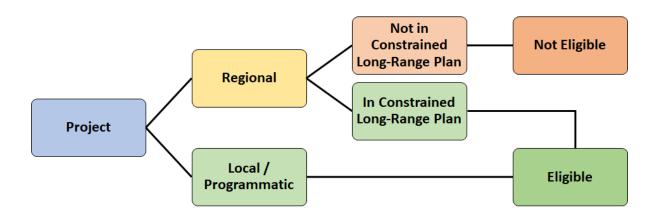


Figure 1: ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency Workflow

<u>ConnectRVA 2045 Consistency</u>: ConnectRVA 2045 establishes categories of projects which are regional in nature and must be included in the constrained long-range plan (CLRP) prior to inclusion in the TIP. Conversely, other project types are considered either local or programmatic in nature and can advance without being specifically listed. The project types under each category can be reviewed in Chapter 5 of ConnectRVA 2045. This project is regional and is included in the constrained long-range plan. Figure 1 graphically shows the consistency review process.

<u>Air Quality Conformity</u>: Portions of the RRTPO were formerly part of the 1997 8-hour Ozone Maintenance Area and projects in these areas must either be part of the Regional Conformity Assessment or must be exempt from air quality conformity analysis under federal regulations prior to being added to the TIP. This project has previously been assessed to not be regionally significant, and this is not included in the regional conformity assessment.

<u>Fiscal Constraint</u>: To demonstrate fiscal constraint for the IAR and Arterial Preservation Network in compliance with NEPA, we are adding \$7,509,206 for the Preliminary Engineering (PE) phase in FFY25 and \$2,759,207 for the Right of Way (RW) phase in FFY27, both sourced from Other Funds. These additions will





support the necessary planning and acquisition activities for the infrastructure projects.

SUBJECT Regional Funding Framework Revisions

BRIEF:

The Flexible Regional Funding program provides funding to support regional transportation improvements using Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) program funds. Moving to a biennial cycle for new projects like the Central Virginia Transportation Authority and Transportation Alternatives programs will allow better alignment of regional funding programs. Several peer MPOs in Virginia have already transitioned to biennial funding cycles.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) recommends moving new project applications to a biennial cycle to align with the Central Virginia Transportation Authority and Transportation Alternatives programs. Existing project requests will continue to be accepted annually to address critical project deficits.

DISCUSSION:

Under Federal law and agreements with state agencies, the Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) has authority to select projects and program regional Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds, including the Transportation Alternatives (TA) set-aside.

The RRTPO adopted a new Regional Project Selection and Allocation Framework in July of 2021. This framework, as amended, establishes a single prioritization process for flexible regional funding for projects requesting RRTPO administered funds. This process establishes a four-step process for project submission, screening, scoring, and funding. In general, the framework follows the prioritization process established in ConnectRVA 2045, the regional long-range transportation plan, establishing a clear connection between regional planning and regional funding. Based on the outcomes of the last three years of funding, several concerns have been identified by Policy Board members, local officials, and PlanRVA staff.





Framework Concerns

Staff have heard concerns about the following components of the regional funding program:

- 1. **Time Commitment** TPO members prepare and PlanRVA staff score and evaluate 34 new project applications every year. Only 6 projects are selected each year with a median award of \$1.9M.
- 2. **Existing Project Priority** Localities submit and the RRTPO funds 8 existing project requests per year with a median award of \$2.0M. More additional funding has been awarded to existing projects than new projects over the past 3 years.
- 3. **Regional Priorities** Approximately 18% of annual applications are for regional priority projects (as identified in the Long-Range Transportation Plan). About 10% of the new project funding has been awarded to regional priorities with most of the funding going to local/programmatic projects.
- 4. **Active Transportation Funding** The changes to Smart Scale have reduced the funding options for active transportation projects. Over the past three rounds, active transportation on arterials and major regional trails have not scored as highly as the sponsors have expected in the regional program.
- 5. **Project Readiness & Delivery** Project readiness is not factored into scoring and screening is limited to estimate and sketches. A sponsor's history of project delivery is also not factored into the scoring and selection process.
- 6. **Timing & Coordination** Some sponsors have expressed interest in additional dialog and coordination through the scoring process. Localities are also interested in continuing to line the TPO program up with Smart Scale for leveraging and to reduce overlapping burdens on staff.

Staff have identified some options to address these concerns. The TAC will continue to study these issues throughout this fiscal year to identify any other program changes which may be needed.

Broad consensus exists around moving to a biennial cycle, mirroring the decision made for the CVTA earlier this year and the current TA program. This would put all regional funding on the same cycle and opposite of Smart Scale, allowing better planning for leverage and reducing the overlapping state and regional funding cycles. This change would allow more time for the TAC to study the concerns while also partially addressing three (3) of the issues:

1. **Time Commitment** – Moving to odd year applications for new projects provides more time for sponsors to prepare application materials and reduces the overall number of projects that are scored. By aligning with the





CVTA changes, there are also opportunities for efficiency in scoring and sponsor coordination for projects that are submitted for funding under both programs.

- 2. **Regional Priorities** The TPO's regional funding program averages about \$35M a year across all three funding sources (CRP, CMAQ, and STBG) which results in approximately \$15M in new project allocations. By moving to every other year, the region would have more funding available to invest in more expensive, regional priority projects.
- 3. **Timing & Coordination** Aligning the TPO and CVTA programs with Smart Scale maximizes the available funding for leveraging and reduces the overlap in work for locality and PlanRVA staff to prepare for Smart Scale and TPO programs.

PlanRVA AGENCY UPDATE RRTPO Policy Board Meeting – October 2024

Function in compliance with the Code of Virginia (Reg'l Cooperation Act) and other state and federal laws. Conduct agency operations in a responsible and proactive way to best meet the organizational objectives and needs of member localities, including sound financial management, staff retention and development, delivery of key work priorities, and continuous engagement with Commissioners, localities, and regional partners.
