CALL TO ORDER

The Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) Community Transportation Advisory Committee Chair, Upton S. Martin, presided and called the May 19, 2022, RRTPO CTAC meeting to order at 12:01 p.m.

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

Chair Upton welcomed committee members, staff and guests to the meeting.

B. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

- VDRPT Transit Equity and Modernization Study Tiffany Dubinsky, VDRPT, provided this report.
 Baseline Conditions Needs & Opportunities - Program-wide Shared across multiple technical areas, there is a need to:
 - Improve data collection, management, and sharing standards
 - Provide technical support and guidance to local transit agencies
 - Provide guidance that includes best practices for fair and modern transit
 - Increase coordination and collaboration between transit agencies, community organizations, institutions, localities, employers, and regional planning bodies
 - Incorporate modernization into fair and just decision-making processes

Potential Actions

- Higher quality transit infrastructure
- Improved processes that center rider needs
- Increased use of state-of-the-art technologies
- Expanded involvement in decision-making
- New or enhanced transit service

Following the presentation, committee members had questions and Ms. Dubinsky offered clarification on a number of items, including:

- The primary audience of the study is the General Assembly; the hope is that the study will be adopted.
- The findings will be incorporated into grant programs; transit agencies will be incentivized to use the ideas in the study.
- The strategies are not financially constrained; there are multiple projects or actions that can meet each need.
- The timelines in the presentation were related to bringing the ideas from concept to executed.
- The focus has been on trying to meet the directive; General Assembly guidance will be sought for moving forward.

2. Update on GRTC's plans for service expansion, zero fare service, and fleet electrification

Adrienne Torres, GRTC, provided this report and gave an overview of the impacts of COVID as well as transit use by mode and rider demographics, A major initiative is: Transit should be safe, accessible and comfortable. Ms. Torres gave an overview on the plans to address inequities as part of the initiative.

Following the presentation, committee members had questions and Ms. Torres offered clarification on a number of items, including:

- GRTC has a contract with VCU and has a number of other partners on the Zero Fare program.
- The decrease in use of express routes is due primarily to the large number of state employees who have transitioned to remote work.
- Other mode options are being considered and will be incorporated where appropriate.

Chair Martin reported that the next meeting will be a workshop with a focus on funding.

2. CTAC Member Comments

Ms. Guthrie announced that VTA received funding from the General Assembly to continue the Zero Fare Grant with the Department of Social Services. Sarah Weisiger reported that the League of Women Voters is hosting a public forum on "Demystifying Zoning: Why It Matters" on Tuesday, June 28th from 5:30 to 7:00.

Mr. Lantz reported that the Better Together webinar scheduled for 2pm today will focus on the Virginia Port Authority.

The PlanRVA office relocation to The Current on Hull Street will take place near the end of 2022.

The following presents a report on major business and action items from the June and July 2022, meetings of the RRTPO Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Richmond Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RRTPO) Policy Board. Video recordings of the meetings can be found on the PlanRVA YouTube channel. Minutes and meeting materials are posted on the PlanRVA website.

Annual Joint Meeting

The first annual joint meeting of the RRTPO Policy Board, the Central Virginia Transportation Authority and the PlanRVA Commission was held June 2, 2022. Keynote speaker, W. Sheppard Miller, III, Secretary of Transportation for the Commonwealth of Virginia, addressed the group and shared thoughts on the importance of all organizations involved working together to ensure funding of the I-64 widening project. He noted the economic benefits that would result. He provided a recap of the funding that is expected to be available from the state budget and the funds requested from the CVTA and the Hampton Roads Authority.

RRTPO Chair David Williams, CVTA Chair Frank J. Thornton and PlanRVA Commission Chair Christopher Winslow shared accomplishments and accolades from their respective organization.

Approval of ConnectRVA 2045 Amendment 2022-01 - Reconnect Jackson Ward

The City of Richmond submitted a request that the Reconnect Jackson Ward project be considered for inclusion in the Richmond Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). Jackson Ward has played an important role in both the history of black Richmonders and Richmond City as a whole. Once a hub for economic and social development, the construction of the Richmond-Petersburg Turnpike disconnected Jackson Ward from itself and the surrounding community, and its effects are still visible today.

This project is early in its development process and the current feasibility study will be complete during the summer of 2022. The scope and scale of the concept is regional in nature and has the potential to be a major improvement to regional travel safety, connect displaced neighborhoods, provide improved accessibility, and directly address existing inequities in the region. Based on staff review of the request, the project fits well within the regional Vision, Goals, and Objectives of ConnectRVA 2045 and would be a worthy addition to the long range transportation plan.

At this time the project does not have committed funding, but the potential of winning IIJA Reconnecting Communities funding would benefit from the project being included in the plan.

Approval of ConnectRVA 2045 Amendment 2022-02 - Interstate 64 widening project from Exit 211 to the James City County line

The Virginia Department of Transportation has submitted a request that the Interstate 64 widening project from Exit 211 to the James City County line be considered for inclusion in the Richmond Region's Constrained Long Range Transportation Plan.

This project has been identified as a priority regional project by RRTPO and the CVTA. The inclusion of the project in ConnectRVA 2045 from exits 205-211 illustrates the commitment of the region. The project estimate at the time ConnectRVA 2045 was adopted was too high for inclusion in the fiscally constrained plan.

Based on staff review of the request, the project fits well within the regional Vision, Goals, and Objectives of ConnectRVA 2045 and would be a worthy addition to the long range transportation plan. At this time, the project has been identified as a priority by the Youngkin administration and has received commitments for \$470 million in state funds, with additional funds expected through a combination of other sources noted above. The remaining needed funding for the RRTPO section of the project is estimated by VDOT to be roughly \$70 million. The administration is confident that the full amount of funding will be identified and committed over the life of the plan.

Socioeconomic Data Work Group Initial Meeting

Socioeconomic Data Purpose

- The Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) is a federally required tool to guide how the RRTPO and its partners will meet the transportation needs of the Richmond region over the next 20 years and beyond.
- Vision Component Vision and Goals for the region.
- Financial component that demonstrate how the recommended transportation plan can be implemented
- ConnectRVA 2045 is RRTPO's latest long-range transportation plan.
- The LRTP must be updated at least every five years to remain consistent with existing conditions, and to re-evaluate proposed plans, programs, and projects.
- The scope development for 2050 update of the LRTP for the Richmond region is underway.

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- The Socioeconomic Data provides estimates and projections of population, employment and other socioeconomic data of the Richmond Region within small geographic areas called Transportation Analysis Zones (TAZs).
- It is an input into the RRTPO's Regional Travel Demand Model (The RTC Model).
- TAZs form the basic geographic division used in travel demand modeling.
- Population and employment within each TAZ create productions and attractions, which in turn create trips between zones. These trips are loaded onto the road network, enabling traffic volumes to be generated on a particular roadway segment.
- The data is also used by local governments, regional and state agencies, and other organizations for a variety of demographic planning purposes since it provides estimates of demographic data at the TAZ level.

- Comprehensive economic development analysis
- Infrastructure planning on a local or regional basis
- Sustainability plans
- Local comprehensive planning in the context of the region Task Objective:

Current Work Efforts Update - Item 6.-b.

Active Transportation Work Group (ATWG)

Since the Policy board adopted the BikePedRVA 2045 plan in early May, the next steps include reconstituting the ATWG, which will be an important driver for implementation of the BikePedRVA Plan. In addition to the regular quarterly meetings, staff continue to work with partners to advance the goals of Active Transportation in the region:

Henrico County's active transportation committee, which is developing the bicycle and pedestrian chapter of the county's comprehensive plan. The first phase of an open comment period with <u>henriconext.us</u> has concluded.

East Coast Greenway Alliance (ECG) on potential designations of segments of the future route of the trail through the Richmond region. The spring Virginia East Coast Greenway committee summit was held virtually on May 24.

Ashland Trolley Line Trail Study

PlanRVA staff continues to work with the National Park Service and a local history team of experts from Ashland, Hanover, and Henrico counties on concepts that will depict the trolley line's former role (ca. 1907-1938) and community connections. Concepts include interpretative signage that can supplement three signs already installed in Ashland, audio stories via app tied to different segments of the trail as it developed, and way-finding signage or mapping that will take trail users to adjacent sites of community interest. Staff hosted a site visit on June 8 with NPS and local history team. Two story maps for the project illustrate the importance and potential for the 14-mile Trolley Line Trail, now a segment of the Fall Line, and includes an updated story map of the <u>history of the trolley line</u> and a <u>design sketchbook</u>.

Central Virginia Transportation Authority

Continued staff support for the daily function of the Authority. Supported meetings of the Nominating Committee, Finance Committee, Technical Advisory Committee and Fall Line Working Group. Specific administrative work tasks included meeting administration and coordination, review of April CVTA action and next steps for Regional Project Prioritization, review of the I-64 gap funding with respect to Virginia's strategy to close the gap and options for CVTA funding. Additional tasks included coordination with VDOT and legal council on development of Fall Line Trail SPAs for design build.

Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan Update

The *BikePedRVA 2045* plan was adopted by the TPO Policy Board on May 5, 2022. With plan adoption, the web site was revised and reordered to create a central source of both document and related resources as a <u>BikePedRVA 2045</u> Information Hub which includes:

- BikePedRVA 2045 story map
- Community Engagement Report story map
- Interactive Map showing bikeways, sidewalks, proposed projects, transit infrastructure, barriers, demographics, crash data, and more
- BikePedRVA 2045 PDF
- Community Engagement Report PDF

The information hub is designed to keep related materials organized and accessible while providing shared navigation. It will be updated periodically with new data and resources.

PlanRVA staff will work closely with partner agencies and localities on the Complete Streets toolbox or illustrated <u>story map</u> to update it as one resource intended to implement *BikePedRVA* 2045.

Public Transportation Services

Participated in the first meeting of the New Kent Community Health Assessment Steering Team on May 17 at the New Kent Health and Human Services Conference Room. Primary topics included introductions of the team members; an overview of the assessment process and why it is conducted; the roles of the steering committee members; and an asset mapping activity that included the identification of community strengths and resources in six key areas.

Participated in the May 18 virtual meeting of the Senior Connections Human services Transportation Coordination Entity Committee. Primary topics included overviews of the Virginia Transportation Navigator, which is a joint project of Virginia Navigator and VDRPT, and the Ride United Service, a program of the United way of Greater Richmond and Petersburg.

Elderly and Disabled Outreach

Participated in the May 17 Senior Connections Board of Directors. During the public comment period of the meeting provided the Board with an update on regional transportation developments associated with GRTC, PlanRVA, the CVTA Technical Advisory Committee, and the Virginia Transit Equity and Modernization Study.
