## CTB approved FY 2024-FY2029 SYIP

The <u>Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) approved</u> the Fiscal Years 2024 to 2029 Six-Year Improvement Program, which allocates about \$6.3 billion in funding to public transportation and rail programs over the next six years. DRPT will administer the funds for rail and public transportation systems in Virginia to help manage traffic congestion and provide transportation choices while also safely transporting people and goods across the Commonwealth.

The CTB approved \$861.9 million in funding for public transportation and rail programs in Fiscal Year 2024.

## FTA releases Transit-Oriented Development Planning NOFO

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) announces the availability of \$13,460,978 to support comprehensive or site-specific planning associated with new fixed guideway and core capacity improvement projects. Proposals must be submitted electronically through the Grants.gov website by 11:59 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time on 10/10/2023. View the FR Notice.

The <u>Pilot Program for TOD Planning</u> provides funding to communities to integrate land use and transportation planning in new fixed guideway and core capacity transit project corridors. As required by statute, any comprehensive or site- specific planning funded through the pilot program must examine ways to improve economic development and ridership potential, foster multimodal connectivity and accessibility, improve transit access for pedestrian and bicycle traffic, engage the private sector, identify



infrastructure needs, and enable mixed-use development near transit stations. The statute also requires that the planning work be associated with a new fixed guideway or core capacity transit project.
