CALL TO ORDER

The Central Virginia Transportation Authority (CVTA) Chairman, Frank J. Thornton, presided and called the June 17, 2022, Central Virginia Transportation Authority meeting to order at 11:00 a.m. He welcomed John Lawson, Deputy Secretary of Transportation, to the meeting.

ATTENDANCE ROLL CALL & CERTIFICATION OF MEETING QUORUM

Janice Firestone, Program Coordinator, took attendance by roll call and certified that a quorum was present.

A. ADMINISTRATION

1. Consideration of Amendments to the Action Meeting Agenda

On motion of Julie Timm, seconded by W. Canova Peterson, the Authority unanimously approved the June 17, 2022, agenda with the following item added under Other Business: approval of GRTC FY23 Regional Public Transportation Plan Adoption. (voice vote).

2. Approval of April 29, 2022, CVTA Meeting Minutes

Kevin P. Carroll reported that there were several votes at the last meeting relating to the Regional Funding Scenario. Patricia S. O'Bannon made a motion during that meeting to approve the Regional Funding Scenario as presented. The motion was reported to have failed. Later, after review of the statute, the interpretation was that the motion carried.

On motion of Kevin P. Carroll, seconded by Levar M. Stoney, the Authority voted to reconsider the Regional Funding Scenario (roll call vote, see Appendix A).

On motion of Kevin P. Carroll, seconded by Levar M. Stoney, the Authority voted to approve the Regional Funding Scenario project list as presented at the April 29, 2022, meeting (roll call vote, see Appendix A).

On motion of Kevin P. Carroll, seconded by Patricia A. Paige, the Authority voted to approve the minutes of the April 29, 2022, CVTA meeting as presented (voice vote).

3. Open Public Comment Period

Mr. John Easter, ChamberRVA, addressed the Authority and expressed his support of CVTA funding for the I-64 widening project. He also commented on the 4/5 majority requirement for voting and noted that he was part of the legislative process that led to the creation of the CVTA. The enabling legislation intended for there to be two voting requirements.

Mr. Christian Schick, Richmond resident, addressed the Authority and expressed his opposition to use of certain terms in referring to road projects, such as the I-64 widening project. He expressed his view that use of phrases like "the project represents all of us", is inaccurate as it excludes those people who do not travel by personal vehicle. He further stated that he felt the benefits of the I-64 widening project have been overstated.

As reported in the May 27, 2022 Richmond Times-Dispatch, the General Assembly of Virginia is now ready to appropriate \$470 million for the widening of I-64. It is my understanding that the CVTA will need to appropriate matching funds totaling \$125 million for this project. Why is it in your best interest of your Citizens to appropriate this funds:

4. CVTA Chairman's Report

Chair Thornton shared thoughts on the success of the recent joint meeting of the RRTPO, CVTA and PlanRVA Commission.

B. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. CVTA Finance Committee update

a. Future Funding and Project Investment Priorities

Mayor Levar M. Stoney, Finance Committee Chair, reported that Rebecca Longnaker spoke at a recent committee meeting regarding CVTA investment returns. She reported that a timeline of Fall Line Trail project funding is needed in order to make better long term investment decisions. Feedback from the CVTA TAC and Eric Gregory, legal counsel, is that the SPA for the northern section of the trail was expected to be ready for CVTA approval at the July meeting. It was actually finalized ahead of schedule and is before the Authority for approval today.

b. I-64 Widening Project

Mayor Stoney reported that a letter of support is on the agenda today that would commit 100 million in CVTA funding toward the project. He gave a breakdown of the funding from other sources. Deputy Secretary of Transportation Lawson addressed the Authority and shared comments on the importance of the project as well as the incredible opportunity the region now has to get this project done. He noted letters of support such as the one before the CVTA are important.

On motion of Patricia A. Paige, seconded by Kevin P. Carroll, the Authority voted unanimously to approve the draft letter of support for distribution of funds for the I-64 project (roll call vote, see Appendix A).

Mayor Stoney closed his report by expressing his appreciation for being able to serve as Finance Committee Chairman. He thanked the inaugural Finance Committee members for their role in the committee, staff and the Finance Directors group for their help.

2. CVTA Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Update

a. June TAC meeting update

Todd Eure, TAC Chairman, reported that TAC met on June 13th and discussed the state budget and funding for the Fall Line Trail.

b. Fall Line Working Group update

The group met on June 1st and discussed the SPA for the northern section. They are also focusing on the locality SPA's.

On motion duly made and seconded, the Authority voted unanimously to approve the following resolution (roll call vote, see Appendix A):

RESOLVED that the Central Virginia Transportation Authority approves the Standard Project Agreement for Funding and Administration between the Central Virginia Transportation Authority and the Virginia Department of Transportation for portions of the Fall Line Trail project, UPC Number 121374, as presented;

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Central Virginia Transportation Authority authorizes the Chairman to execute the agreement and staff to take all actions necessary and prudent to fulfill its terms.

c. VDOT / CVTA State Project Agreement

TAC is focusing on the SPA's between the localities and the CVTA. The agreements will be reviewed by TAC, legal counsel and staff and should be brought before the Authority for approval in the next couple months.

3. CVTA Staffing Update

Neil Spoonhower reported that second-round interviews are being held next Thursday. That will complete the second round of interviews. They are very optimistic that a candidate will be selected following those interviews.

4. CVTA Nominating Committee Report

John H. Hodges, Nominating Committee Chairman, reported that the committee is making the following recommendations:

FY 23 Officers, subject to their acceptance by the candidates:

- Kevin Carroll (current Vice Chair) for Chair
- Levar Stoney (current Chair of the Finance Committee) for Vice Chair

Finance Committee members:

• Carlos Brown and Canova Peterson (current Finance Committee members) with Patricia Page as a replacement should either Mr. Brown or Mr. Peterson chose not to serve next year. As Mr. Brown has indicated that he will not serve on the committee, Ms. Paige is recommended.

The Committee also voted to recommend that the new Chair consider establishing a committee to consider a rotation system for involving all CVTA members who are not automatically reappointed to encourage participation in the Authority's offices.

A. OTHER BUSINESS

GRTC FY23 Regional Public Transportation Plan Adoption (added to agenda) Adrienne Torres, GRTC, presented this request to the Authority and gave an overview of the plan.

On motion of Levar M. Stoney, seconded by Kevin P. Carroll, the Authority voted unanimously to adopt the GRTC FY23 Regional Public Transportation Plan (roll call vote, see Appendix A).

1. Proposed FY23 CVTA Meeting Schedule

On motion of Levar M. Stoney, seconded by Patricia A. Paige, the Authority voted unanimously to approve the proposed the FY23 meeting schedule as presented (roll call vote, see Appendix A).

It was noted that alternative meeting locations will need to be identified for meetings from November through January due to the PlanRVA's upcoming relocation.

2. Member comments

Chairman Thornton thanked his fellow Authority members for their support and for the work that has been done during his time as Chairman.

Other members shared comments and expressed appreciation to fellow members for the way the CVTA Authority members work together and the importance of the work that has been done.

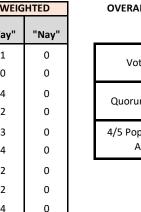
