- Population: +38%
 - •81% moving into Urban Crescent
- Road Network: +13.4% | VMT: +42%
- **Highways**: +13.3% | **VMT**: +75.3%
- Flights: -23.6% | PPF: +143.6%












VMT Per Virginia Interstate Lane Mile























Virginia 2040

- 1.3 million more Virginians;

- 7 million Virginians will live on less than 1/3 of our state's landmass.

"The I-95 Study analyzed many potential improvements to this critical corridor. It found that widening I-95 by one lane in each direction for 50 miles would cost \$12.5 billion. While the cost was staggering, the most sobering part of the analysis was that by the time construction was completed in 10 years, the corridor would be just as congested as it is today. That finding is what led Virginia to rail."
